2024 MN TRIAD Conference

Over 80 attendees, vendors and presenters from 13 different counties participated in our 2024 MN TRIAD Conference held on Tuesday, September 17, 2024 at Sourcewell in Staples, MN. By the smiles, laughter and networking that were shared all day long, it was a great success!

Our day started at 8 AM with registration, impromptu guitar music and fun by Tim Eggebraaten and Todd County Chaplain David Greaver and morning treats from Witches Brew -yum! Todd County Sheriff Mike Allen welcomed everyone, Chaplain Greaver offered an opening prayer and our day began. Sheriff Mike and our MN TRIAD President Carlton County Sheriff Kelly Lake shared the emcee role as duty called for Sheriff Mike! Off-Duty Chief Tim Eggebraaten started our day with a great presentation on "I am, I can, I will" about the rhythm of life and what to do when our rhythm is "off." Tim shared a story about being a Norma/Norman - "I want to remember the people who have helped me!" He left us many points to ponder, including "Life events happen FOR us, not TO us," "Don't let your attitude be on autopilot," and the importance of networking – we're not meant to do life alone!" As always, Jay Haapala from AARP was a wealth of information about scams and how we can protect ourselves. He shared some eyeopening information about AI (Artificial Intelligence) - including an actual demonstration on our cell phones for how scammers can take your picture and transform it into all types of situations (including illegal situations). You can try this for yourself at the website - www.deepfake.civai.org. Jay said using technology is not the problem, it's that technology is also available to scammers. A couple notes of interest: there was a 400% increase in scams between 2019 and 2023 making COVID one of the largest causes of security risks ever and Medicare out-of-pocket cap will be \$2,000 for 2025. Lasagna, a breadstick and salad were served for lunch by Griff's Pizza out of Long Prairie awesome food with awesome service! The brownies provided by Farmer's Union (and made by Verna) for dessert were enjoyed by everyone! While enjoying our lunch, Jay Haapala presented Sheriff Mike with the AARP Community Fraud Fighter Award for his prompt assistance in recovering money for a victim of a scam in Todd County. Most fraud victims have no chance of recovering their money once it is sent. That is unless law enforcement can act swiftly and use their authority to stop the transfer, whether at the bank or in this case with the USPS. Congratulations, Sheriff Mike...and THANK YOU!!

Our MN TRIAD Meeting followed – thanks to Itasca, Kandiyohi and Grant (tentative) counties for volunteering to host the next 3 conferences! Sheriff Kelly led the Best Practices location. Call-takers (Dispatchers) may also session. Thanks to all the counties for providing information ahead of time and for the "extra' information shared at the conference! Hilltop Kitchen provided delicious homemade cookies to be enjoyed during our afternoon speakers!

Jode Freyholtz-London from Wellness in the Woods shared her story and information about what Warmline is – a peer support connection that is a safe and free way for individuals to receive confidential and anonymous one-on-one peer support from trained Peers, Certified Peer Support Specialists, and Recovery Coaches. She also talked about how Peer Support is already being used in several Jails and she will be speaking with more counties in the future. (https://mnwitw.org)

Steve Hoover from Central MN Council on Aging wrapped up the conference with a lively session on Living with Purpose and how to flourish in the second half of your life! He gave us several "assignments" and "homework" during this session that encouraged us to set an intention each day to make a difference and that opportunities are everywhere! It's All About Safety

Calling 911

While you may know that you should call 911 in an emergency, you may not be sure of when you should not call 911. Too often, requests to 911 do not involve a true emergency, which overloads the 911 system with non-emergency calls. Here are answers to some common questions:

What happens when you call 911? Many 911 call centers follow protocols that guide callers through a sequence of questions to quickly obtain information necessary for dispatching the right responders to the right

provide instructions about what to do until help arrives. Questions include:

- Nature of the emergency
- Your name and phone number •
- Location of the emergency •
- Details of the emergency

What if you accidentally dial 911? If you or a child accidentally dial 911 by mistake when no emergency exists, do not hang up - that could make 911 officials think that an emergency exists and possibly send responders to your location. Instead, simply explain to the Dispatcher what happened.

Can I dial 911 from a wireless phone without a wireless calling plan?

All wireless phones, even those that are not subscribed to or supported by a specific carrier, can call 911. However, calls to 911 on phones without active service do not deliver the caller's location to the 911 call center, and the call center cannot call these phones back to find out the caller's location or the nature of the emergency. If disconnected, the 911 center has no way to call back to the caller.

Oftentimes, children are given old cell phones to play with, unaware that if the child dials 911, a live call with be connected with the local 911 call center. It is recommended that the phone's battery be removed before giving these phones to children.

How do I place a "test" call to make sure 911 works for me?

Test calls can be scheduled by contacting your local 911 call center via its non-emergency phone number. Texting to 911 may also be an option -check with your local law enforcement.

Please do not call 911 to obtain the nonemergency number.

Having someone from your Dispatch (911 Call) Center come and talk with your seniors at your TRIAD meeting is a great way to learn more!

One TRIAD project is a "My Location Card" which has a place to write your name and address, as this is information you may not know or remember during a crisis situation! (Credit to Cass County TRIAD)

Recipe

Cookie S'mores (Dip)

Graham Crackers or cookies* 4 large chocolate bars, broken up 1 package chocolate chips 1 1/2 packages mini marshmallows Cast Iron or Aluminum Pan

Break up chocolate bars and put on bottom of pan, then add chocolate chips on top of that, and finish with the mini marshmallows on top.

Put pan on grill or in a 350 degree oven. Watch close... will not take long to melt and/or brown on top (probably less than 5 minutes). BE CAREFUL: Cast Iron Pan will be very HOT!

**Other suggestions were to use a non-stick cooking sprayed pan in oven or cupcake liners (may want to use heavy duty ones) for individual servings. We found it easier to spoon the s'mores on top of the cookie, but it is actually a dip!

*If making your own cookies, use a small scoop (or about half the size of a regular cookie). Following is the cookie recipe that was used in the Grill-Off.**

Soft Chocolate Chips Cookies

1 ½ c shortening	1 ½ c sugar
1 ½ c brown sugar	3 tsp vanilla
3 eggs	1 ½ tsp salt
1 ½ tsp soda	3 c flour
chocolate chips (to your liking)	

Mix all ingredients and drop by scoopful on cookie sheet. Bake at 350 for about 13-15 minutes.
